

## GLOBALIZATION



**Examiner:** How do you think globalization might change the world in the future?

**Student:** I think that if globalization continues to develop, young people of the future will have a different understanding of things like nationality and culture.

**Examiner:** Can globalization make the world a more equal place?

**Student:** I think this depends on what you mean by equal. If people in a country have the same opportunities in life, then globalization is good and can help the world but this is not always what happens.

**Examiner:** What are the main disadvantages of globalization?

When my parents were young, the local dialect in our town was spoken all the time, but now more and more people in the town are from other countries and our dialect isn't spoken so much. **Examiner:** Do you think globalization has made the world a better place?
