

# **STRUCTURES**THE MOST USED



# 1. TO GET (SOMEONE) TO + Verb (Persuade or convince someone to do something)

• **Example:** She got her brother to help with the project.

Example: How can I get him to apologize?

# 2. TO STOP (SOMEONE) FROM + Verb(ing) (Prevent someone from doing something)

Example: The rain stopped us from going to the park.
Example: They stopped him from making a big mistake.

#### 3. TO MAKE SOMEONE + Verb (Force or cause someone to do something)

• Example: His joke made everyone laugh.

Example: The teacher made us rewrite the essay.

# 4. TO HAVE SOMEONE + Verb (Request or arrange for someone to do something)

• **Example**: I had my assistant send the email.

• Example: She had the plumber fix the leak.

### 5. TO LET SOMEONE + Verb (Allow someone to do something)

• Example: My parents let me stay out late last night.

• Example: Will you let me explain?

# 6. TO BE USED TO + Verb(ing)/Noun (Be familiar with something or comfortable doing it)

Example: I'm used to waking up early.

Example: She's used to the cold weather.

#### 7. TO HAVE A HARD TIME + Verb(ing) (Struggle with something)

- Example: He has a hard time understanding accents.
- Example: I had a hard time finding the restaurant.

#### 8. TO KEEP + Verb(ing) (Continue doing something repeatedly)

- Example: He keeps asking me the same question.
- Example: I keep forgetting my keys!

### 9. TO BE ABOUT TO + Verb (Be on the verge of doing something soon)

- Example: I was about to call you when you texted me!
- Example: She's about to leave for work.

# 10. TO LOOK FORWARD TO + Verb(ing)/Noun (Be excited about something in the future)

- Example: I'm looking forward to meeting you.
- Example: She's looking forward to the weekend.

### 11. TO END UP + Verb(ing) (Eventually do something, often unexpectedly)

- Example: We ended up staying at home instead of going out.
- Example: She ended up getting the job after all.

### 12. TO BE WORTH + Verb(ing) (Something is valuable or beneficial to do)

- **Example**: This book is worth reading.
- Example: Is it worth visiting that museum?

### 13. TO WOULD RATHER + Verb (than ...) (Preference between two options)

- Example: I would rather stay home than go to the party.
- Example: He'd rather walk than take the bus.

#### 14. TO CAN'T HELP + Verb(ing) (Be unable to stop doing something)

- Example: I can't help laughing at his jokes.
- Example: She couldn't help crying during the movie.

#### 15. TO BE SUPPOSED TO + Verb (Expectation or obligation to do something)

- Example: You're supposed to finish your homework before playing games.
- **Example:** Isn't she supposed to call me back?

### 16. TO BE LIKELY TO + Verb (Something will probably happen)

- Example: She's likely to win the competition.
- Example: It's likely to rain tomorrow.

### 17. TO BE USED FOR + Verb(ing)/Noun (Explain the purpose of something)

- Example: A hammer is used for driving nails into wood.
- Example: This tool is used for cutting paper.

# 18. TO HAVE SOMETHING DONE (Passive Causative) (Arrange for something to be done by someone else)

- Example: I had my car fixed yesterday.
- Example: She will have her hair cut tomorrow.

### 19. TO FIND IT + Adjective + TO + Verb (Describe an opinion or difficulty)

- Example: I find it hard to wake up early.
- Example: She finds it easy to learn new languages.

### 20. TO SPEND TIME + Verb(ing) (Talk about time used doing something)

- **Example**: He spends hours watching YouTube videos.
- Example: We spent the weekend relaxing at the beach.

#### 21. TO BE ON THE VERGE OF + Verb(ing) (About to do something very soon)

- **Example:** She was on the verge of crying when she got the bad news.
- Example: I'm on the verge of making a big decision.

# 22. WOULD RATHER + Subject + Past Simple (Express a preference for what someone else does)

- **Example:** I'd rather you stayed home tonight.
- Example: She would rather he didn't talk about that topic.

#### 23. IT TAKES + (Time) + TO + Verb (How long something takes to do)

- Example: It takes 20 minutes to get to work.
- **Example:** It took me hours to understand the lesson.

# 24. THERE'S NO POINT IN + Verb(ing) (Something is useless or not worth doing)

- Example: There's no point in arguing about it.
- Example: There's no point in worrying too much.

# 25. AS SOON AS + Subject + Verb (Something happens immediately after something else)

- Example: Call me as soon as you arrive.
- Example: She left as soon as the meeting ended.

### 26. IN THE MIDDLE OF + Verb(ing) (Be busy doing something at the moment)

- Example: I was in the middle of cooking when you called.
- Example: She's in the middle of writing a report.

#### 27. TO BE BETTER OFF + Verb(ing) (It's preferable to do something)

- Example: You'd be better off studying for the exam instead of watching TV.
- Example: We're better off taking a taxi than walking in the rain.

#### 28. TO BE BOUND TO + Verb (Something is certain to happen)

- Example: She's bound to succeed with all that talent.
- **Example:** It was bound to happen sooner or later.

# 29. CANNOT AFFORD TO + Verb (Not have enough money or resources for something)

- Example: I can't afford to buy a new car right now.
- Example: We can't afford to lose more time.

# 30. THE MORE + (sentence), THE MORE + (sentence) (How one thing increases as another increases)

- **Example:** The more you practice, the more you improve.
- Example: The more he eats, the more he enjoys it!

### 31. TO BE MEANT TO + Verb (Something is intended or expected to happen)

- Example: This book is meant to help beginners learn English.
- Example: We were meant to meet at 3 PM, but he was late.

### 32. TO CAN'T STAND + Verb(ing) (Strong dislike for something)

- Example: I can't stand waiting in long lines.
- Example: She can't stand people who are always late.

#### 33. TO BE WORTH IT (Something has value or is beneficial)

- Example: The trip was expensive, but it was worth it.
- Example: Learning a new language takes time, but it's worth it.

### 34. TO BE (JUST) ABOUT TO + Verb (Something is going to happen very soon)

- Example: I'm just about to leave. Do you need anything?
- Example: She was about to call you when you arrived.

# 35. TO FIND IT DIFFICULT/EASY + TO + Verb (Describe an opinion about an action)

- Example: I find it difficult to concentrate in noisy places.
- Example: She finds it easy to make new friends.

# 36. TO BE LIKELY/UNLIKELY TO + Verb (Express probability of something happening)

- Example: It's likely to rain tomorrow.
- Example: She's unlikely to change her mind.

### 37. AS IF + Subject + Verb (Describe a situation that appears a certain way)

- Example: He looks as if he hasn't slept in days.
- Example: She acted as if nothing had happened.

# 40. TO KEEP IN MIND THAT + Subject + Verb (Remind someone of an important fact)

- Example: Keep in mind that the deadline is next Monday.
- Example: You should keep in mind that learning a language takes time.
