

1. **advise** (verb): “I advise you to buy a good dictionary.”
advice (noun): “Can you give me some advice?”
2. we say **some advice** or a **piece of advice** (not an advice).
“Let me give you **some advice**.”
“She gave me a very useful **piece of advice**: to buy a good dictionary.”

OTHER WAYS OF GIVING ADVICE

3. “You **should** try to practise English.”
“You **ought to** read more.”
4. “**Why don’t you** join an English club?”
5. “You’d **better** stay in bed for a couple of days”
6. “**If I were you, I’d** watch less television.”
7. “**I suggest** visiting the Eiffel Tower.” (We should all go.)
“**I suggest that you** visit the Eiffel Tower.” (I’m not going.)
8. “I **recommend** the lasagne.” (It’s a very good dish to choose in this restaurant.)
9. “**You could always** take a break and come back to the task later”
10. “**Have you considered** the idea of working from home to increase productivity?”
11. “**In your position, I would** take the time to carefully analyze the data before making any major decisions.”
